

North Wing Restoration, Ash Lawn-Highland

This reconstruction entailed extensive design of architectural components to resemble details which were present during the lifetime of President James Monroe, original owner of the house 175 years ago. The architect's charge was to research the structure's original condition, analyze unaltered portions of the building, work closely with archaeologists, and use specialized methods to reconstruct the north wing to its 1816 appearance. A mid-19th century porch enclosure and late-19th century siding were removed and new siding was installed. A stone ground gutter also was reconstructed around the perimeter.
